Chair, okay, as a sanction, recuse him from participating in matters because he now is a public advocate. You have to choose. He has chosen to serve as an impartial decision-maker, he can't take the other chair now. I would ask you to consider that, please. It's very, very important.

The second aspect of this testimony has to do with some of the issues that -- that one considers. I worked for 10 consecutive, or more, okay, election seasons at the Haiku Community Center, okay, as a public official -- precinct official. Okay. We don't question the voters why they vote, who they vote or when they vote. That's not our business. Nobody knows. If I don't vote for any particular reason, nobody knows. And that protects my secrecy. And that's the way it should be

So if you make judgments upon the assumption that you know that a person is not voting because, one, he doesn't know the candidates, all of those types of things, that's a fiction. That's not a fact. And that should not even be considered as a reason for doing any of the above. It's the secrecy of the ballot.

You got two months to study the candidates, if you're interested. You can find out who they are, if you're -- and that's always been a part of our system.

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...BEGIN PUBLIC TESTIMONY...
MR. SMITH: Mr. Chair, Members of the Charter

Commission, thank you very much for serving.

This is an important testimony for me because I think what's -- what's happening is our Charter requires that you study, study the operation of government. And it is implicit that your decision-making is going to be impartial. And it's going to be based upon an accumulation of knowledge that you'll get from your study. Okay. So your integrity is based, I believe, that position pointed, you're going to study, and, then again, you're going to make decisions that are impartial.

A member of this Charter Commission now is a public advocate of a specific agenda, an item that you will be deliberating upon and studying. And I would ask the Chair, or the member specifically, to recuse themselves from participation on any discussion of this particular item. Because, to me, that brings into question the integrity of your work. And any one person should not bring, by its actions or its passion, or any other thing, into question the integrity of the work of this Commission.

So I would ask that the member recuse himself.

And I would ask, if he does not recuse himself, that the

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It's good there's nothing broken with that system.

We have two senators in the United States Congress. California has two senators in the United States Congress. No problem. System is good. Maui's system is good until you show me it's not. And you can't show me it's not with fiction. And that's all you have to go on so far.

The better question is why aren't people voting. Since 1991, we've had a new government, entrepreneurial model of government, everybody recognizes, constantly change. Bring it in. They wanted a situation where if you were young in the department that you could look ahead and say this is what I need to do to become a fire chief. That's why it was formed.

And in reality, that really hasn't occurred. Nothing against anybody in any position right now, but, as far as qualifications go, there really are none. I mean, you can -- you can be a captain for five years, that does not qualify you to be a chief. You really need to understand that.

And, again, I didn't understand all of this when I was in the department because you have a limited perspective. Getting out of the department and running my own business, I'm now like, wow, you really need to be good at spreadsheets, you need to know personnel matters, you better know workers' comp laws. Maui Electric, I did a lot of workers' comp investigation. You -- there's so much more than just being in a firehouse and putting out a fire. And -- and that level of position needs that expertise.

And a lot of the people now, who are in the upper levels, aren't really happy because they're now thrust in this very difficult situation that, really, I

MR. BLACKBURN: It came from within the ranks. And -- and I think what we're looking for, at least my personal situation, would be a process that takes a lot of these situations into account. Where, you know, the -- I'll look at it this way: When we -- I interviewed at Maui Electric, the interview was three hours long and completely numerically scored, very difficult questions. My interview for chief was probably 45 minutes, and there was no second or third interview. And so I think

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1 because of a commission situation, trying to get all 2 these people in the same room to make personnel 3 decisions is difficult. I think personnel decisions 4 should be left to the -- to the mayor. 5

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CHAIR STONE: Commissioner DeLeon.

MEMBER DELEON: Do you believe -- Joe, do you believe that the commission -- the Police Commission --I mean, the Fire Commission took the politics out of the selection of the fire chief?

MR. BLACKBURN: No, it did not.

MEMBER DELEON: Following up, do you -- can you give a concrete example of how having a commission kind of slows things down?

MR. BLACKBURN: Well, I think it's become a little bit more of a popularity contest because firefighters will like the person who says and is really nice. And sometimes you may want somebody who really isn't nice or will do and make the difficult decisions. And so I really don't want to give concrete examples, but I think, in the last two situations, the process, again, wasn't, I think, geared for running a multi-million-dollar organization. And that's what we

23 2.4 And like I say, everybody who is in department 25 I love. My two sons are in the department, so I would distinguish it from the pile of paper you have to go through.

I'll just hit the highlights.

The most important thing you'll do today is choose, hopefully, an analyst and a secretary. That is crucial to your -- to your effectiveness. Getting the right one, on both of them, is really crucial. And I hope you will not allow any factors except who is the best person to determine your -- your decision.

The second thing I will just touch on very briefly is I think some of you still feel that you're -that you are not independent of the Council. And I think for you to do good work, you have to understand that you're independent of the Council. And that is your strength. And every 10 years, we get a chance to have decisions made that are independent of the Council. When it involves the power of the Council, that's very important.

I have given you some -- if you will read the green thing, when you have time. For example, Mr. Kushi has told you, you have to spend two months at the end of your tenure in going back and forth between the Council. But I think an independent attorney could tell you this is not necessary and is going to be a mere waste of your -- of your very valuable time. But you can check

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1 that out and see what you think about that.

> As far as communication with the public is concerned, I did send in a testimony, on July 3rd, that didn't make it onto the agenda. And I'm not sure why that happened, but it was essentially concerned with your rules. And I know that you have a rules item on your agenda. But my -- my testimony I sent in July 3rd didn't make it. But it -- you'll get it eventually.

Summary minutes. Summary minutes are going to be crucial for your communication with the public and even when members miss a meeting. If you had summary minutes, they could be ready the next day. And they could be approved by the Chair or the Vice-Chair and posted as draft minutes on the website. Everybody would know what had happened at your meeting.

For example, you went to Hana recently. I would love to know what happened at Hana. I have no way of knowing what happened at Hana for a month when -when the transcript is done and it's approved.

So your communication with the public is very flawed. If you had summary minutes -- they're perfectly legal -- and they can be done by -- a qualified person can do excellent summary minutes that get the essence of your meeting without having it be 40 pages long.

You also need the transcript. I am -- I am

1 not want to make something worse for them. But I 2 think -- as they sit in the fire station, I want them to 3 think to themselves, if I want to be chief one day or a 4 battalion chief or assistant chief, what do I have to do 5 above and beyond coming to work. something I read once, it's -- when you give people time limits, they're going to talk about the most important things they need to. And there's nothing prohibiting anybody from coming back to this Commission every single time we meet, either.

And I'll go a little bit further. I'm not in to having dialogue and discussion once we've closed public testimony. You will never get your work done if we have to go back and say, well, public, what do you think about what we just discussed. They have that freedom to address it in the next meeting through testimony, either in person or through other means.

So that's kind of my feeling about it. I just don't think we need this additional three minutes. Go for the three minutes per as interpreted by the rules for each agenda item, I'm okay with that. And that's pretty much all I have to say on that.

CHAIR STONE: Commissioners -- Commissioner Okamoto.

MEMBER OKAMOTO: Well, I was the one, originally, that thought three minutes was too restrictive. After sitting through, I think that if we give three minutes on each agenda item, and if we have 10 things, I mean, you've got 30 minutes that someone can -- and I do think that there needs to be a better

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but I'm not opposed to saying we can suspend our rules, either, if we feel the need to do that. So I can go both sides of this issue.

However, when it was brought to our attention as how it was interpreted -- and I'm not opposed to that, either -- if you want three minutes for each agenda item, I'm totally supportive of that. It's this additional three minutes that I'm feeling is not necessary. That was something I think we gave in addition to what is normal procedure in these public meetings.

I have been on both sides of this fence; as a participating commissioner on various commissions and boards with time limits, I've also been in the public and had to concise my testimony to three minutes. So I know what it's like to be on both sides. And while it's been pointed out sometimes that three minutes is not enough, from my experience, particularly on this Commission, we have given a lot of latitude to have discussion with the testifiers, to ask appropriate questions of clarification and sometimes even more information.

And I appreciate the testifiers that have come and all those who will come in the future.

I also would say that what I find interesting,

and signed up for nine agenda items, that would be unrealistic, especially as we move into a period when we need our time. So I believe that we do have to set a defined amount of time. I do think that, unfortunately, we have to cut off the testifier at a certain point, when their time is up. We have to. Otherwise, we've had situations where testifiers would just continually go on and on and on. So we have to have these set of rules in place.

And what we should do right now is define the set amount of time that we're comfortable with per testifier commenting, total. Whether it be allow them an extra three minutes or not, take it to five minutes, whatever our group is happy with. Oral testimony is critical.

I noticed in Hana, also, that when the oral testifier gave us written testimony, we were able to ask questions about the written testimony. So it seems like that was a very smart thing to do, was to bring written testimony along with oral testimony.

So let's talk about the duration. What do you guys think is enough time for the testifier to get their point across, or points, on all agendas items, and not to make them feel overly rushed, but, also, to keep in a realistic timeframe?

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MEMBER OKAMOTO: So if I'm going to a public meeting, I really only have the three minutes. If I'm coming to one --

CHAIR STONE: Well, actually, that's six.

Four plus three -- seven minutes, actually, right now.

MEMBER OKAMOTO: But if I'm coming to one of our meetings, it might be seven things on the agenda. So, again, you know, if we go with that interpretation of per agenda item, it kind of gives an unbalance from the public meetings to our meetings.

CHAIR STONE: Commissioner DeLeon.
