SUBJECT: Amendments to Article 10, Code of Ethics, Maui County

Charter

On April 2, 1992, Board of Ethics Chairperson Paul Kaneshiro presented the following recommendations to the Charter Commission:

1. Section 10-4 (1) (d) should be amended to read:

1.d. Represent private interests in any action or proceeding against the interests of the county or appear in behalf of private interests before any agency of which the individual is an employee or in a transaction in which the individual has participated or will participate.

- 2. Section 10-4 (1) (e) should be amended to read:
- 1.e. Use county <u>time</u>, <u>equipment</u>, property, <u>facilities</u>, or personnel for other than public activity or purpose.
- 3. Several Board members have recommended that a new subsection to Section 10-4 (1) be added that would require an official or employee to disclose that individual's county position if the official or employee is involved in a public activity in which he/she may take official action.

The Board of Ethics counsel has reservations regarding this recommendation for several reasons. First, Section 10-4 (1) (c) would address this area of concern. Second, the disclosure requirement is unduly restrictive and may inhibit county employees from participating in community activities. Third, if a county employee fails to disclose his/her county position a violation of the Code of Ethics will occur. As a result, the employee will be subject to disciplinary action for not disclosing such information.

- 4. Maui County Code Section 2.56.040 requires that lobbyists, prior to appearing before any executive or legislative body, file a certified statement with the Board. Maui County Charter Section 10-2.2 which sets forth the Board's duties does not include this responsibility. Therefore, Section 10-2.2 should be amended to include a new subsection to read:
 - g. Receive and file lobbyist registration forms.
